Introduction What's the True Story?



From that effort came forth the publication of the book, "HE MADE A WAY OUT OF NO WAY: The life, legacy and lessons of Bishop Matthew Nathaniel Richardson."

He knows What He's Doing!

"Wait for the Lord; be strong, and let your heart take courage; wait for the Lord!"
Psalm 27:14

Reflection Questions

- 2. What are good ways to encourage yourself that God knows what He's doing when you have to wait for Him to act?

The First Promise

"I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and her offspring; he shall bruise your head, and you shall bruise his heel."

Genesis 3:15 (ESV)

In the book of Genesis, we learned that God created the heavens and the earth, and all things that inhabited it. On the sixth day He created man and woman in His likeness. He placed them in the beautiful Garden of Eden and supplied them with an abundance of everything they needed. God had given them access to everything in the garden, but He prohibited them from eating from the tree of knowledge of good and evil. Both Adam and Eve were well aware of God's instructions, but they allowed the serpent to manipulate them to go against the will of God. On that day, the Lord let Satan know what He had in store for him.

When we live outside the will of God, just like Adam and Eve did, God still loves us. The birth of Christ is proof of that love. Jesus's birth marks the beginning of God's way of restoring our relationship with Him through the New Covenant. It took 20 generations from Adam to Abraham and 42 generations from Abraham to the birth of Jesus. During the Christmas season, we should focus on God and how He kept His first promise to ensure that nothing will ever separate us from His love.

Reflection Questions

- 1. Have you ever made a promise and for whatever reason, broke it? How did that make the person who received the promise feel?
- 2. Are we not blessed that we serve a God that stands by His word, even when we constantly go outside His will?

Heavenly Father, I come to you not worthy, but grateful for the promises you have made and the promises you have kept. Thank you for the greatest gift of all, redemption through Christ Jesus. Amen.

The Promise of our Savior in Isaiah

"Therefore, the Lord himself will give you a sign: The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son and will call him Immanuel."

Isaiah 7:14

"Therefore, the Lord himself will give you a sign: The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son and will call him Immanuel." Isaiah 9:6

In this scripture we have one of the most beautifully poetic promises of the Messiah's coming reign. Yearly we recite this verse and hear it sung and celebrated during Christmas time. Yet this verse also contains a reference to one of the great, incomprehensible truths in the Bible: The incarnation – a child is born, a son is given. God would become a man, a newborn baby would be called "The Mighty God, The Everlasting Father." We accept this truth by faith, but we cannot fully grasp what it meant for the second person of the God head to shed His eternal state and put on flesh, "which is the Christ, the only begotten son of God (St John 3:16).

Paul tells us that Jesus took the form of a servant and became a man. "Wherefore God also hath exalted him and given him the name which is above every name." Phil 2:7-11 (please read)

Reflection Questions

- 1. Can you identify a story from the Gospels (the New Testament books of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John) which portray Jesus as a servant to others?
- 2. What does this story tell you about Jesus and the purpose of His coming?

Prayer

We give God all the honor, all the glory, and all the praise for this great promise we have in His beloved and only son, Christ Jesus. Amen.

DECEMBER 4 Message of Hope

"5 Behold, the days are coming, declares the Lord, when I will raise up for David a righteous Branch, and he shall reign as king and deal wisely, and shall execute justice and righteousness in the land. 6 In his days Judah will be saved, and Israel will dwell securely. And this is the name by which he will be called: 'The Lord is our righteousness.'"

Jeremiah 23:5-6

In a time of great darkness, God promised to send a light who would shine on everyone living in the shadow of death. Jesus is both "mighty God" (all-powerful) and "Counselor" (all-loving). He is our message of hope which was fulfilled in His birth and the establishment of His eternal Kingdom. Jesus came from the house of David and took His throne to deliver all of us from the slavery of sin, John 3:16-17. It appeared that the royal lineage of David was cut down like a tree and only a stump remained. Yet God would take that stump and bring forth a green shoot, a Branch. The Branch of righteousness would come from the lineage of David, and lead God's people as a successful King. Prosperity, justice, and righteousness will mark His reign. That King is Jesus!

Yes! In fulfillment of the prophecy foretold over 700 years before the birth of Christ, the prophet Isaiah declared in Isaiah 7:14, "Therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign. Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son and shall call his name Immanuel." Immanuel means "God with us." Jesus Christ fulfills the prophecy foretold long ago, and just as God fulfilled His promise to send our great king, Jesus, we can always be grateful that through Jesus Christ He also kept His promise to save us from sin and death, delivering us into new life if we only believe.

Reflection Questions

- 1. It is amazing that God can keep a promise He made 700 years in advance! How does God's fulfilling prophecy of Jesus' birth increase your faith in God?
- 2. How has the *Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father and Prince of Peace* blessed your life with hope in the Christ Child?

Prayer

Lord, I thank You for the Branch of Righteousness, the Christ who was foretold of long ago in the Scriptures so that I would believe and receive God's love through salvation. Help me to continually seek the Scriptures for the truth of the prophecies of Christ, who came to save the world from sin. Amen.

Foretelling is to tell beforehand. Foretelling and prophesying are synonymous. God used prophets to speak on His behalf. Prophets often foretold what was to come.

In 2 Kings 7, the prophet Elisha foretold of God's deliverance for His people to the king of Israel. Famine struck causing prices for food to become overwhelmingly inflated (2 kings 6:24-25). It got so bad that people delve into cannibalism (2 Kings 7:29), but the prophet Elisha prophesied deflation and abundance within 24 hours (1 Kings 7:1). The kings officer heard what Elisha foretold and responded with doubt saying, "That couldn't happen even if the Lord opened the windows of heaven." As a result of the officer's doubt, Elisha responded, "You will see it happen with your own eyes, but you won't be able to eat any of it!" In other words, it's going to happen, but you will not be able to receive it because you didn't believe it.

Like Elisha's foretelling, God uses the prophet Isaiah, in Isaiah 9, to deliver hope to God's people. A Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father and Prince of Peace was foretold. God is not a man that He should lie (Numbers 23:19). Believing God's word (the Bible) is an act of faith no matter our current circumstances. Let's not be like the king's officer who failed to receive because of his unbelief. How sad it would be to see Christ, yet miss out on Salvation because we chose not to believe (Hebrews 9:28, Daniel 7:18).

Reflection Questions

- 1. Do you believe in Jesus? (Are you saved? John 3:16, Romans 10:9)
- 2. How has doubting God's love for you kept you from receiving what God has for you?

Prayer

Dear God, forgive me for allowing my unbelief to rule over my ability to receive that which you've reserved for me. I believe but help my unbelief. It's in your son Jesus' name I pray, believe and receive. Amen.

The Foretelling of God's Word

My son, Terrell, is captivated by meteorologists and has a profound passion for studying the weather. For every news forecast, Terrell listens intently as the Meteorologist shares the weekly outlook. To our delight, Terrell keeps my wife Natasha, and I informed about potential thunderstorms, reminding us to wear jackets as northern winds approach the city. He even urges us to locate flashlights in case of a power outage when severe thunderstorms are predicted. We know that meteorologists sometimes miss the mark; a slight shift in wind patterns can lead to unexpected changes in the forecast.

Similarly, the prophet Isaiah foretold the coming of our Savior, Jesus Christ. When Isaiah spoke, this prophecy had not yet materialized. But in God's perfect timing, His revelation emerged. Luke 2:11 tells us, "For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord." This prophecy serves not only as a foretelling, but also as forth-telling. Hebrews 1:1-2 reminds us, "In the past, God spoke to our ancestors through the prophets, but in these last days, he has spoken to us by his Son." This message underscores the continuity of God's voice.

God's word is steadfast and true, transcending all human wisdom and philosophy. These words, inspired by the Holy Spirit, have shaped moral values, societal norms, and cultural practices worldwide. God's word never falters!

Let God's holy foretelling through the scriptures bring you comfort. Even in a storm, find solace in His promises. When all else fades, His word will endure forever! Even when you cannot trace Him, His truth compels us to trust Him! Allow His truth to guide you in all things. Unlike meteorologists, God's prophecy is unfailing!

Reflection Ouestions

- 1. How will you allow the word of God to become the solid foundation of your daily walk?
- 2. Knowing that God's word is speaking for our present time, what commitments are you willing to make to ensure your witness speaks louder than your words?

Our Father and our God, we thank you for the wisdom that your word gives. We thank You for the gift of Your son, Jesus Christ, that all men are saved in His name. Please help us to reflect on the truths of your unfailing word. Let your word be hidden in our hearts that we may be found holy and acceptable unto you. Reflection Questions

- 1. Satan's primary tactic is deception (John 8:44), and he wants you to believe that you are far from God and that God is not speaking. What circumstances or emotions make you feel distant from God or as if He is silent? What lies have you believed when you've felt that God is silent or distant?
- 2. When you reflect on your life, what situations or moments make you feel close to God? Do you notice any patterns in how you hear God's voice? For example, through Scripture, nature, conversations with others, music, art, or other experiences?

Prayer

Jesus, thank You for Your constant presence through the Holy Spirit. Help me to recognize and pursue Your voice in every circumstance. Give me ears to hear You when You speak boldly and when You whisper softly. I long to know Your voice more deeply and follow You with all my heart. Amen.

John 3:17

"This is the bread that came down from heaven. Your ancestors ate manna and died, but whoever feeds on this bread will live forever."

John 6:58

Genesis 3 is often referred to as The Fall. In this moment in the creation story man was separated from God by his desire to act on his own in open rebellion to the command of God not to eat from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. Adam's disobedience and sin, and his refusal to admit his mistake or apologize, betrayed the relationship between God and man. This set the precedent for all humanity's sin and the required death. But, the All Knowing God, in His infinite wisdom and love, predestined (planned in advance) Jesus Christ, His only begotten Son to be the Savior of all humanity.

Both the coming of Jesus as a Child and His sacrifice on the cross was prepared before the foundation of the world (Revelation 3:18) and is mentioned when Moses writes, "God said I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and hers; he will crush your head, and you will strike his heel" (Genesis 3:15). "'Don't be afraid, Mary,' the angel told her, 'for you have found favor with God!" Luke 1:30 NLT

The story of Mary being visited by the Angel Gabriel (Luke 1:26-33) and told that she would be the mother of the Christ child is mind-blowing. Not just the message, but the method of its delivery. God dispatched an angel from His throne room in glory to pass a message to a young woman in a little out of the way town called Nazareth. This means that God does not mind speaking to ordinary people leading ordinary lives, and that's where the challenge is. What if one of the great lessons in this story is not that God is willing to speak to ordinary people, but it is actually that ordinary people must be listening for His voice.

I want to do better at quieting my world and listening for the voice of the God of all creation who speaks to ordinary people like you and me. I invite you to join me in the exercise of cultivating sacred silence and listening for God's voice in your own life.

Reflection Questions

- 2. As you spend time in prayer and reading your Bible, in what ways have you heard God speaking to you?



Purpose on The Path

"1 In those days a decree went out from Caesar Augustus that all the world should be registered. 2 This was the first registration when Quirinius was governor of Syria. 3 And all went to be registered, each to his own town. 4 And Joseph also went up from Galilee, from the town of Nazareth, to Judea, to the city of David, which is called Bethlehem, because he was of the house and lineage of David, 5 to be registered with Mary, his betrothed, who was with child."

Luke 2:1-5 (ESV)

The decree from Caesar Augustus, calling for a census, was more than an inconvenience. For Joseph and Mary, it was a call to obedience, requiring a 90-mile journey while Mary was near delivery. Though the decree likely stemmed from a ruler's greed and pride, its timing aligned perfectly with God's plan to fulfill the prophecy (Micah 5:2), bringing the Messiah to Bethlehem, the city of David.

Joseph and Mary's response reflects humble submission to life's seemingly arbitrary yet binding demands—as they trust in God's presence as comfort for life's burdens. Their path to Bethlehem wasn't just about duty—it became a path to unforeseen blessings. Though they likely faced challenges, God provided safe passage and the profound blessing of Jesus' birth in Bethlehem, marking the beginning of a hope-filled promise to the entire world.

Sometimes, God's most profound blessings are revealed when we follow Him in obedience, even when the path is difficult or doesn't align with our plans. Like Mary and Joseph, we are invited to trust that God uses all circumstances—even those that feel imposed upon us—to bring about His good purposes (Romans 8:28).

Reflection Questions

- 1. What areas in your life feel like burdensome obligations rather than blessings?
- 2. How can Mary and Joseph's journey encourage you to discover unanticipated blessings in your own circumstances?

Prayer

Lord, help me to trust You and respond in obedience, even when the path is hard. May I find courage in knowing that You are working through all situations for my good and Your glory, revealing blessings I might not expect. Amen.

The Journey To Bethlehem

"So Joseph and his wife, Mary, left Nazareth, a village in Galilee, and journeyed to their hometown in Judea, to the village of Bethlehem, King David's ancient home. They were required to register there, since they were both direct descendants of David. Mary was pregnant and nearly ready to give birth."

Luke 2:4-7 TPT

Taking a meaningful journey requires time and preparation. Some years ago, it was necessary for me to spend some significant time, during the winter months, in Washington DC for a graduate academic program at Wesley Seminary. The change from the warmth of the deep South, where I resided, to the cold icy climate of the Northeast sector of the United States, was abrupt. My whole system was often in shock. It seems as though the three-and one-half hour flight was never enough time to adequately prepare my mind and body for the change of weather.

Can you imagine not having a season of Advent, no time to prepare for the blessed Christmas event? Perhaps you have had the strange sensation that felt like you have gone to sleep on Thanksgiving and awakened on Christmas. For those of us needing a little time to get into the Christmas spirit, it is important to prepare for the coming of the Christ Child.

The Bible lessons, daily and weekly, telling the story of the coming of the Messiah, are important as preparation for His coming. To hear again the prophet's proclamations that "every valley shall be exalted" and "unto us a child is born", to listen with the heart to the angels singing "Glory to God in the highest", and to stand in wonder with the shepherds and in adoration with the wise men, are all important parts of the journey to Bethlehem.

This is Advent! How much poorer we would be without it. When one prepares spiritually and emotionally for the holy season, the culmination of it is filled with joy and fulfillment.

Reflection Questions

- 1. Reflect on a time that you felt unprepared for celebrating Christmas spiritually. What happened?
- 2. What are some of your important practices which help foster the spirit of goodwill during Advent?

Risks Worth the Promise

4 And Joseph also went up from Galilee, from the town of Nazareth, to Judea, to the city of David, which is called Bethlehem, because he was of the house and lineage of David, 5 to be registered with Mary, his betrothed, who was with child.

Luke 2:4-5 (ESV)

I wouldn't consider myself a risk-taker at all. I find safety in routine and trust that if I stay in my comfort zone, I avoid all the scary things that come with the unknown. But what if Mary & Joseph never took the risks that gave us a Savior?

Caesar Augustus has put out a decree, calling people around the world to go back to their ancestral homes. This moment is important to note, because although secular powers authorized this act, it was God's divine plan! Doing this would lead Mary & Joseph into Bethlehem, where the Messiah would be born. This was foretold in Micah 5:2. Was this convenient for the young couple? Absolutely not, but when we reflect on the importance of family lineage and how God's wonders worked through family lines, bringing Joseph back to his home was significant to the prophecy.

As Mary & Joseph traveled, imagine the conversations they had on the way. The journey ahead was filled with uncertainty, discomfort, and most certainly risks. Mary was in her final stage of pregnancy. The physical toll of traveling for days had to be exhausting and uncomfortable. God showed the couple His plans for them, but they probably still dealt with the thoughts of wondering, "Why us"? Although her pregnancy was from the Holy Spirit, Joseph risked his reputation reentering his homeland knowing what others may have thought.

God does not show us all the details or outcome of our daily walks of life. He calls us to trust in Him, even when the journey is risky. We should be reminded through Mary & Joseph's journey that courage and faith are essential in order for His promises to come to fruition.

Reflection Questions

- 1. Think about the human risks associated with fully trusting in God. What are the spiritual rewards given by God when we trust in Him?
- 2. What's an experience on your Christian Walk that you've gone through that had many obstacles, but was ultimately worth the journey?

Prayer

Lord, as we reflect on the journey of Mary & Joseph, teach us to walk with faith, despite the obstacles and risks we face daily. Thank you for being my constant guide and walking with me in all things. May we take each step boldly, and remember your love never leaves us alone. Amen.

"But they were childless because Elizabeth was not able to conceive, and they were both very old."

Luke 1:7

The word *Advent* means "the arrival" or "the coming", and it carries with it the idea of waiting. Waiting can be challenging. It reveals the truth that we are not in control. However, if stewarded rightly, waiting can bring transformation to our character. We wait for relationships to come, for depression to pass, for our financial situation to change, and for social change in our communities. Waiting is part of our journey through life with God. If we hold our season of waiting before God, it can become profitable for our lives. The biblical narrative is full of men and women who have had to wait.

In Luke 1:5-6, we are introduced to a couple who are no strangers to waiting—Elizabeth and Zechariah. Luke offers a brief biographical sketch of their character: they were righteous, devoted to God, obedient to the Lord's commands, above reproach, and part of a priestly lineage. A 1st-century Jew would have been impressed by these credentials—until you reach verse 7. They were old, childless, and unable to have children. In their cultural context, this would have brought shame and disgrace. Children were considered a tangible sign of God's blessing. Imagine the toll that years of unmet expectations would have taken on their souls. To make matters worse, Zechariah's name means "whom the Lord remembers" and Elizabeth's means "my God is abundant." What happens when your name means one thing, but your reality tells a different story? It must have seemed as if God had forgotten them.

What ministers to me about Zechariah and Elizabeth is that they remained faithful in their waiting. They were committed to the Lord, even in their waiting. The hope of a future Messiah lifted them beyond their present circumstances. It seems that, regardless of their situation, they were determined to remain faithful to God. What I find especially beautiful about their story is that, in verse 11, it says, "Then an angel of the Lord appeared...", God intervened. Let this elderly couple be an example to us as we navigate our own seasons of waiting.

Reflection Questions

- 1. Do you feel that you are in a season of waiting? If so, identify and journal about what you are waiting for in your life.
- 2. Read Luke 1:5-80. How can you remain faithful in your waiting, like Elizabeth and Zechariah? What promise of God can you cling to in this season?

Prayer

Lord, fill me with Your presence today. Give me eyes to see and ears to hear how You are working in me. Grant me the strength and endurance to wait. Help me remain faithful to You in this season of waiting. Help me to focus on Jesus, the author and perfector of our faith. Amen.

O Come, O Come, Emmanuel

"...but [He] emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form."

Philippians 2:7 NRSV

What does it mean to be spiritual today? For some persons, to be spiritual means refraining from involvement in the affairs of the "world." "Don't relate to or speak to social, political, and economic issues," they say. "Leave these concerns to the experts in those matters. The church should stick to preaching about Jesus."

This sacred-secular tension has been with the church for a long time. Why must one make a choice? God was moved by compassion to give the world a Great Savior who is concerned with both the spiritual and social realities of the world. A scripture from the Bible that arrests our attention at Advent is John 1:14 MSG. "The Word became flesh and blood and moved into the neighborhood. We saw the glory with our own eyes, the one-of-a-kind glory, like Father, like Son, generous inside and out, true from start to finish."

During this holy season, the church prepares in word and deed to reflect and point toward the One coming. The one who left the heavenly place of preeminence to revolutionize the earthly domain. Jesus urged that if we are truly spiritual, we would feed the hungry, give the thirsty drink, welcome the stranger, clothe the naked, heal and visit the sick, liberate the oppressed, and love those who hate us.

So, as the church prepares for the coming of the Messiah and His kingdom of redemptive power and liberation, let's remember a church that is not relevant in the social contexts will lose its way, but a church that is not spiritual has already lost its way.

Reflection Ouestions

- 1. If you can imagine Jesus reading the morning paper, do you believe that he would be oblivious to the plight of immigrants, the unhoused, those out of work, and corporate greed?
- 2. How can a faithful church and/or a conscientious spiritual leader better prepare to serve as Gospel ambassadors to the crisis' in our surroundings?

O come, o come, Lord Jesus, and by your saving power, redeem your captive people. Make us impatient with the lack of compassion and social relevancy of the church in this post- Christian 21st century. Set us ablaze to present a holistic gospel to those who know and those who need to know Jesus the Christ and His kingdom of liberation. Amen.

Plan of Salvation
